

A Level IV rest home, Oasis will be constructed on the site of the long-dormant Odd Fellows Home across the street from DPRH. Oasis at Dodge Park will be built in two phases of 41 beds each in single-story structures. It will offer residents plenty of comfort. Whereas Dodge Park Rest Home affords its sixty residents 26,000 square feet of living space, the new facility will boast 30,000 square feet per 41 units, "or more than 700 square feet per resident," Mr. Shalev said. Lots of glass and lots of light will give Oasis at Dodge Park a natural feel, he said.

# An Oasis in the making

"California Dreamin" is what Micha Shalev and Ben Herlinger have done for years except they have transported their visionary thinking from the Golden State to the East Coast.

Their ambitions to make a mark in the healthcare industry did not end with the purchase of Dodge Park Rest Home (the former Heald mansion) on Randolph Rd. From the outset they looked for opportunities to expand the services they offer. "The Day Club at Dodge Park" with its activities and programs for senior adults is one evidence of this, as was their interest in the Washburn House property in Webster Square before it became a hospice facility.

It made perfect sense for Mr. Shalev and Mr. Herlinger to turn their focus at some point to the oncemagnificent and now-dilapidated circa early-1900s Odd Fellows Home building and grounds directly opposite Dodge Park Rest Home and that's what they've done. With DPH approval (already obtained) and barring unexpected complications (as for instance a snafu at a zoning hearing on June 17th) ground will be broken this July or August for "Oasis at Dodge Park"—a Level IV 82-bed rest home for persons suffering from memory impairment and dementia.

Completion of the \$15 million project featuring a combination of private rooms with private baths, private rooms with shared baths and semi-private rooms will enable Oasis at Dodge Park to be open for business in the latter half of 2014.

It will mean demolition of the historic brick-andmortar Odd Fellows Home on about a 415-acre site.

In anticipation of the \$450,000 a year in property taxes they will face, "we have asked the city for help" in the form of a TIF, Mr. Shalev said. Dodge Park's attorneys, Seder & Chandler, are negotiating this with Paul Morano from the city's Office of Economic Development.

Oasis at Dodge Park with its four main entrances from the north, south, east and west, its use of balanced and natural light to "bring the outdoors inside" as Mr. Shalev puts it, its central courtyard, its parklike atmosphere, its compatibility with the neighborhood and the nearly 80 jobs it will create is well worth the city's support, Mr. Shalev said.

Oasis at Dodge Park will be an extension of "what we do" at Dodge Park Rest Home," Mr. Shalev said. "We employ 72 people here at Dodge Park Rest Home and 93% of them are local. We will also be using local labor" to the fullest extent possible with the new ventre, he said.

Oasis is needed, he noted. "People don't want to be a nursing home. They want a more home-like setting."

Korean War Vet Frank Carroll of the Small Business Service Bureau is pictured congratulating Marine Sgt. William B. Soutra Jr. on receiving the Navy Cross for extraordinary courage in maneuvering his platoon out of the kill zone while exposing himself to enemy fire in Afghanistan on July 11th, 2010. Their meeting occurred prior to a dedication of the gymnasium at Columbus Park Preparatory Academy on Lovell St. in Sgt. Soutra's honor on June 10th. Mr. Carroll also snapped a salute after speaking during a ceremony officiated by Worcester Mayor Joseph M. Petty. Rep. John Binienda, School Committee Member Jack Foley and At-Large Councilor Michael Germain were among those noting that Sgt. Soutra is representative of a neighborhood that has produced its share of national heroes including Mr. Foley's grandfather Gen. Thomas Foley (for whom Foley Stadium on Chandler St. is named) who was a twostar general in World War I. Gen. Foley grew up at 84 Lovell St. and then also lived at 17 Circuit Ave. "Thomas Foley was one of the greatest generals our nation ever had," Mr.Binienda said. Sgt. Soutra, who attended Columbus Park as did many members of his family, continues this tradition. As part of his duties Mayor Petty read a citation from the president commending Sgt. Soutra for his sacrifice in support of Operation Enduring Freedom "with complete disregard for his own safety."


